Travel the world with your children—without leaving home—and enjoy some of the most exciting international films for children age 3-12: films that open them up to the lives of children in other countries, enabling them to gain an understanding of and sensitivity towards people of different cultures. You and your children can also engage in virtual hands-on workshops that will turn them into clay model makers and junior film critics!

Since many film programs are based on classic and contemporary children's books—from both the US and abroad—they help reinforce an interest in reading and literature, while complementing the Massachusetts Public School System's Curriculum Frameworks. For children who can't read yet or have difficulty reading subtitles, there are several programs in English.

To help maximize your children's enjoyment of the festival, we've created some age guidelines that you'll find marked on each film program or workshop. Children mature at different ages, however, and you know your children best.

Calling all aspiring film critics! **Joyce Kulhawik** and **Boston Globe film critics Ty Burr and Peter Keough**, members of the Boston Society of Film Critics, will be your guide during this two day virtual workshop on the finer points of film criticism.

During Day 1 the critics will explain how to watch a film critically, provide insight into the language of film, and offer tips on how to organize your thoughts for a review. Participants will watch a film, possibly together as a group. For Day 2, participants will be asked to present a review of the film, which they will share for comments and advice from the film critics and fellow participants

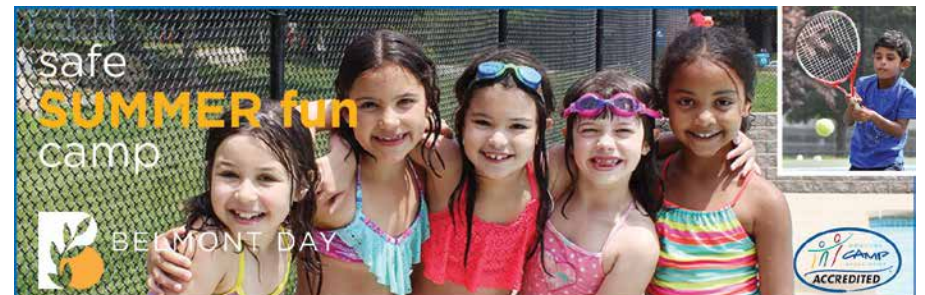
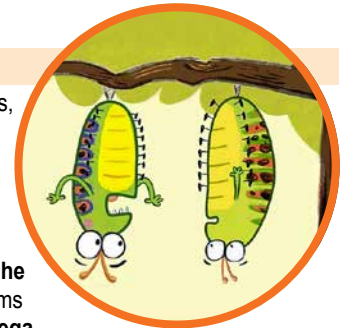

Films include: **A Grain in a Strange Land**, about the importance of caring for nature; **The Rare Flower**, a story created by the students about seven friends who went to an enchanted forest to look for the rarest flower in the world; **My Mother Was a Fogaceira**, about the woman who created the dresses for the Celebration of the Fogaceiras, the most famous tradition in the town of S. Zog and the Flying Doctors is the follow up to last year's *Zog*, in which a keen but accident-prone dragon learns how to fly, roar, breathe fire, and save a princess during his first year at Dragon School (and which features the voices of *Game of Thrones*' Kit Harington, *Fleabag*'s Hugh Skinner, and comedian Tracey Ullman). In this sequel, Zog, Pearl and Gadabout are now a flying doctor trio caring for creatures, including a mermaid, a unicorn, and a sneezy lion. Great stories and rich and imaginative animation are the hallmarks of the award-winning Magic Light Pictures, which regularly brings to life the much loved picture books by Julia Donaldson and Axel Scheffler (*The Gruffalo*)—the UK's most successful picture book authors. **Age 3-8**
